Charlotte Boyd was a miracle worker: she made my brain read with a pop: "stop" and "go". I'll remember that day forever. Kathleen Dorholt taught us to make words into stories but even more importantly, she taught us that we had worth. RuthAnn Kinnunen opened my door to leadership and national travel. Were it not for Ruthie, I wouldn't be in this job. She is still teaching at the ALC in Staples.

Until I encountered Mr. Sundeen, school was a breeze. When I hit bio, it was study or flunk; there was no in-between. I credit my Water Safety Instructor (life guard certificate) to bio: I learned to hold my breath to avoid gagging when fishing a fetal dissection pig from a tank of brine. Mr. Sundeen used unique phrases such as, "...pies, cakes, cookies, cinnamon roooollssss, and donuts". I hear those phrases at every class reunion still today.

New Mealviewer features

These new features will be available May 19 to tailor to your student(s) needs. Print the lunch menu on one page; choose the meal options you want using the content control and print. EL TIDBIT

On May 5, the BPS EL department received the results of the annual English language proficiency test, ACCESS. All English learners who took the test (administered during a 6-week window in January, February, and the beginning of March) will have a score report sent home to their parents within the next week. Another copy of the report will be stored in the green EL folders in the students' cumulative files.

Due to the heightened language demands of college and career readiness standards, WIDA (the consortium responsible for publishing the ACCESS test) has also recently raised English language proficiency expectations. The nationwide results of the 2017 ACCESS test reflect those higher cut scores—some EL students' scores went down, while fewer students exited the program with North Dakota's required 5.0 overall score and 3.5 in each of the four language domains. Be sure to ask your school's EL resource teacher about your EL students' ACCESS scores, and be prepared for any questions families might have about their child's English language proficiency level.
